

Epidemiology and Prevention of Vaccine-Preventable Diseases. 4 sessions (3½ hours each session): This course provides the most current information available in the constantly changing field of immunization. Session One covers principles of vaccination, general recommendations on immunization, and strategies to improve immunization coverage levels. Session Two covers pertussis, polio and *Haemophilus influenzae* type b. Session Three covers measles, mumps, rubella and varicella, Session Four focuses on hepatitis A, hepatitis B, influenza, and pneumococcal disease.

Vaccines: Separating Fact From Fear (2001, Children's Hospital of Philadelphia, Vaccine Education Center). 1 session (35 minutes): Some parents have begun to question whether the benefits of vaccines still outweigh their risks. They ask "Are vaccines safe?" and "Are vaccines still necessary?" This videotape was created to provide comprehensive, easy to understand answers to these and other questions that are based on the best scientific evidence available.

The Immunization Encounter: Critical Issues (2002). 1 session (2½ hours): This videotape was created to provide answers to a wide variety of issues and questions related to administering vaccines in the healthcare setting.

Immunization Techniques: Safe - Effective - Caring (2001, KPBS TV. San Diego & California Dept of Health Services Immunization Branch). 1 session (35 minutes): Discusses the best practices (most effective, least painful, competency-based) used by healthcare providers administering vaccines.

CDC Immunization Update (2½ hours): Up-to-date information on the rapidly changing field of immunization. Topics include influenza vaccine, both injection and intranasal mist, pneumococcal conjugate vaccine, hepatitis B vaccine, new pediatric combination vaccines, and smallpox vaccine.
